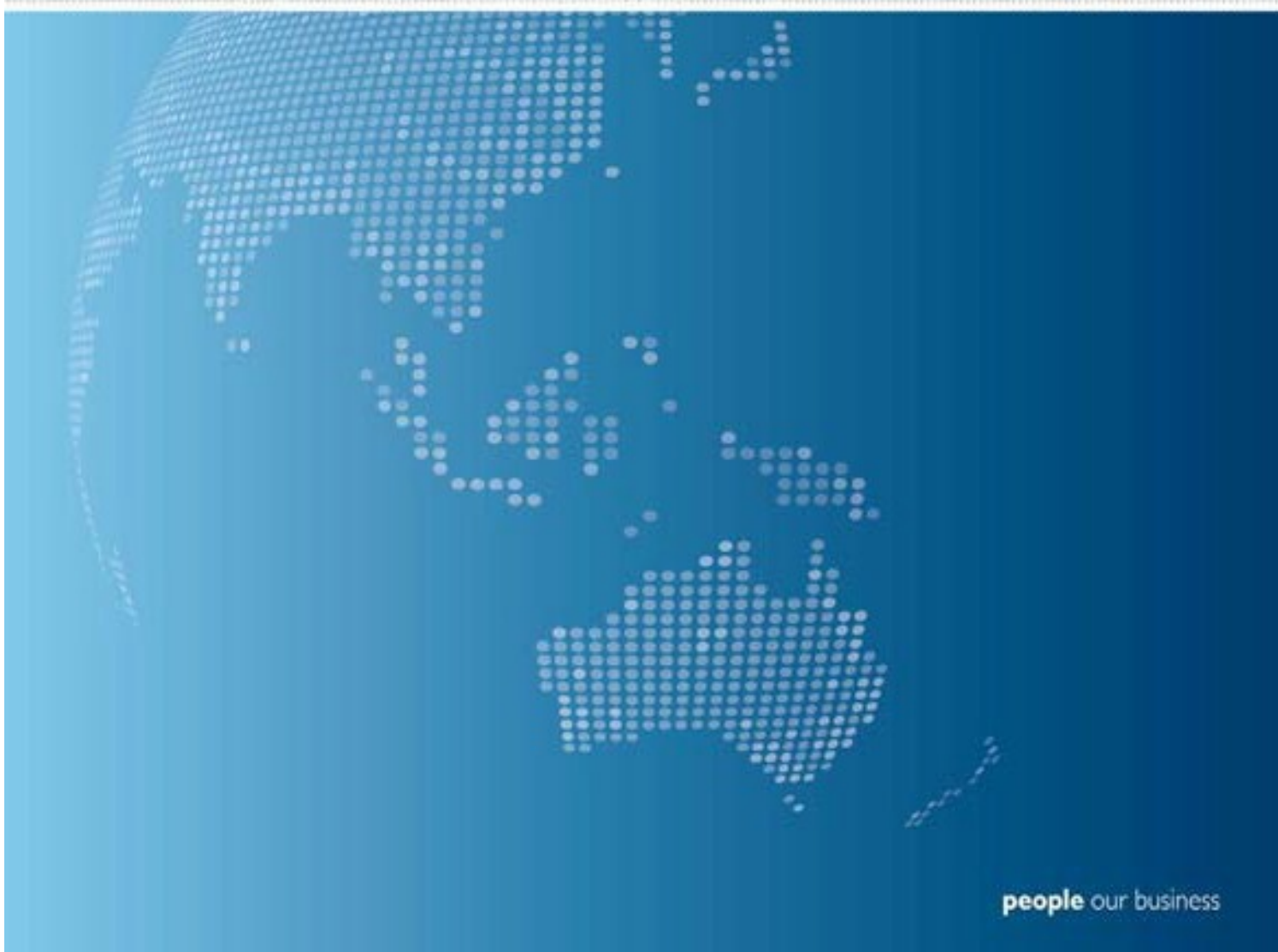
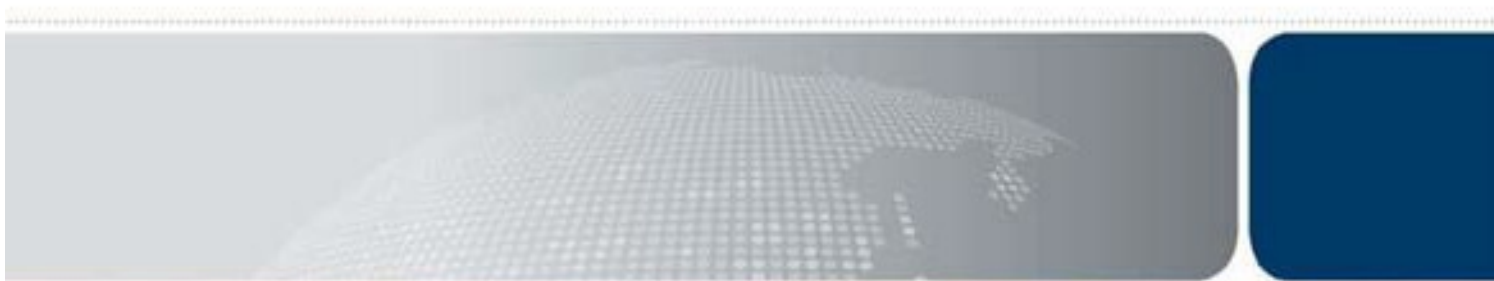

# Immigration Detention Statistics Summary

30 November 2011



## ***About this report***

This report provides an overview of the number of people in immigration detention in Australia as at midnight on the date of the report. The report is produced on a monthly basis.

Data is sourced from several departmental processing and recording systems. Data relating to the immigration detention population is dynamic and there can be delays in transmission of information from the department's immigration detention network operations. Variations in figures between this report and previous issues can occur. Due to these issues, data from the current financial year should always be considered provisional.

## IMMIGRATION DETENTION STATISTICS SUMMARY

*Detention Operations Division, DIAC - As at 30 November 2011*

There were 4409 people in immigration detention facilities and alternative places of detention, including 3464 in immigration detention on the mainland and 945 in immigration detention on Christmas Island as at 30 November 2011. Separately, 1324 were living in the community under a residence determination.

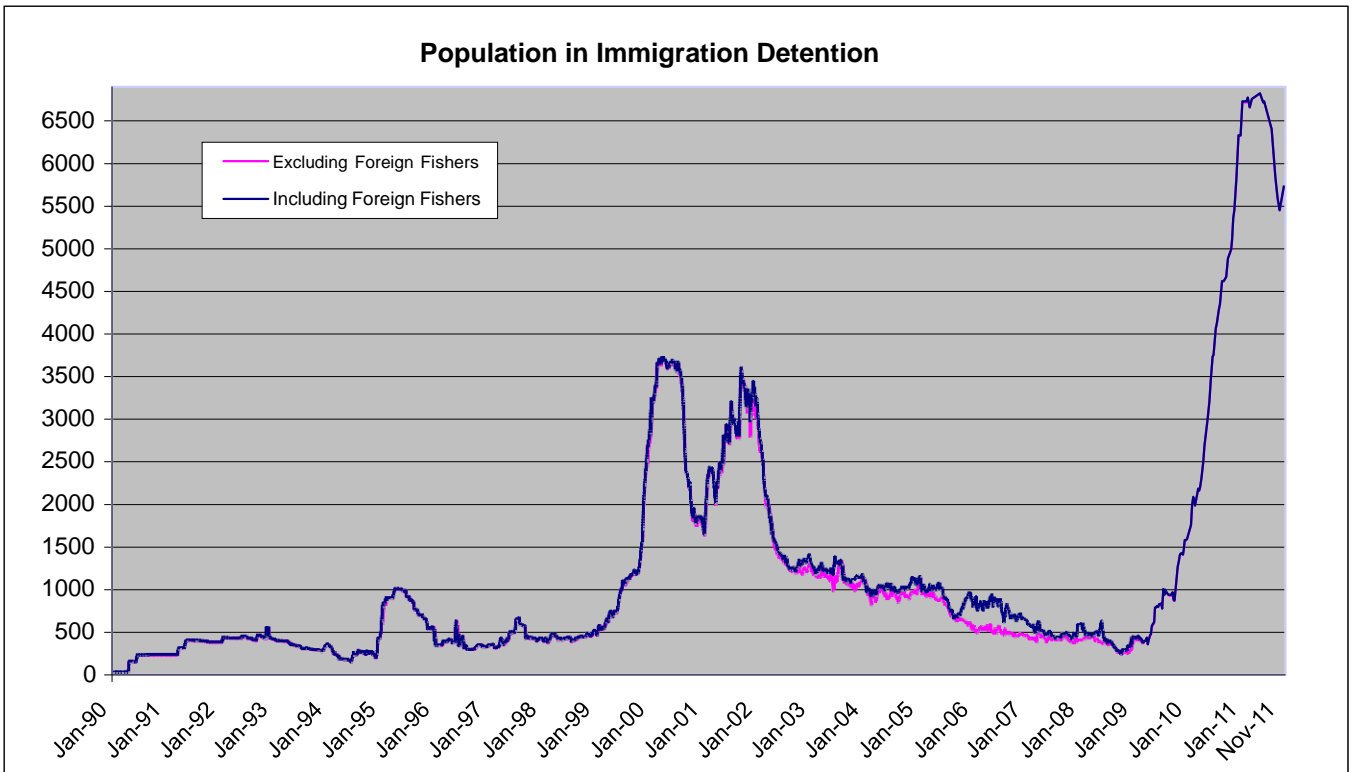

**Immigration Detention Population from 1990 to November 2011.**

The number of people in immigration detention declined between April and October 2011. The number of people in detention in November has increased, predominantly as a result of increased irregular maritime arrivals intercepted in Australian waters during the month.

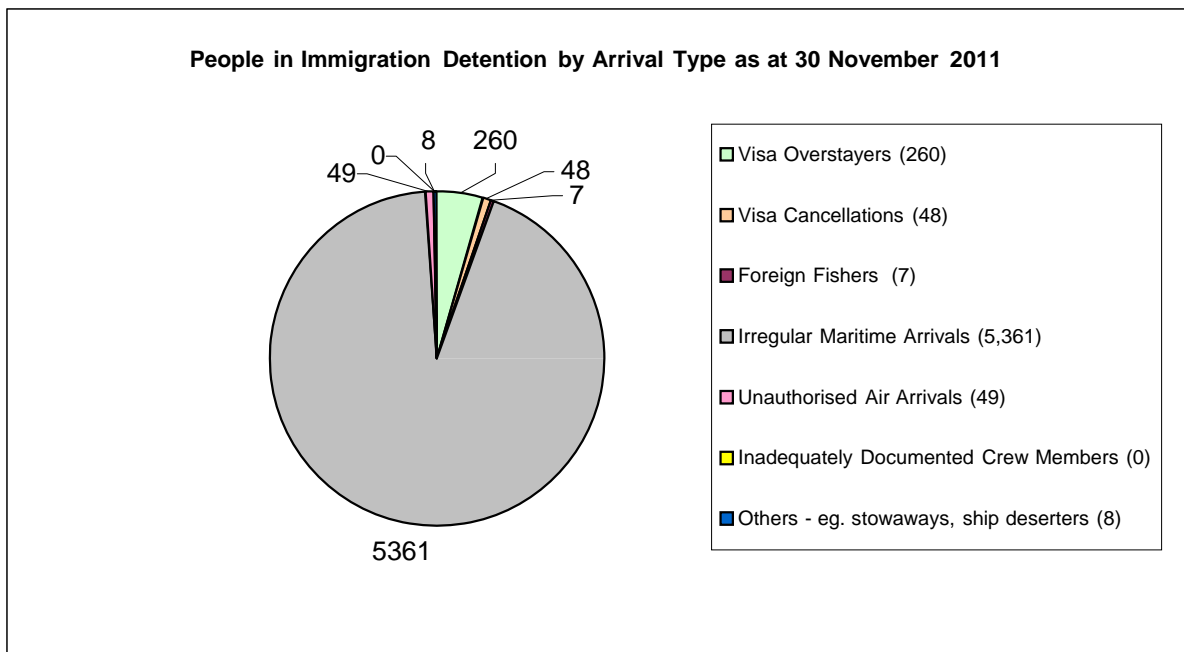

**People in Immigration Detention by Arrival Type**

The number of people in immigration detention who arrived unlawfully by air or boat as at 30 November 2011 was 5410, representing about 94 per cent of the total immigration detention population. There were also 308 people (about 5 per cent of the total immigration population) who arrived in Australia lawfully and were subsequently taken into immigration detention for either overstaying their visa conditions, resulting in visa cancellation.

## People in Immigration Detention by Nationality

Of the 4409 people in immigration detention facilities and alternative places of detention as at 30 November 2011, around 28% were Iranian nationals, 27% were Afghan nationals and 8% were Indonesian nationals.

Of the 1324 people in the community under residence determinations as at 30 November 2011, around 35% were Iranian nationals, 18% were Sri Lankan nationals and 15% were Afghan nationals.

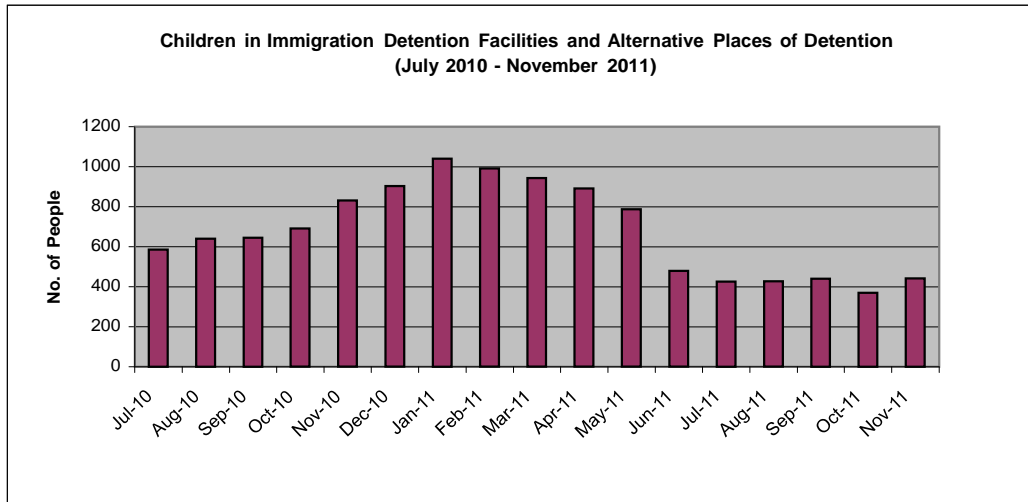

## Children in Immigration Detention

As at 30 November 2011, there were 441 children (aged under 18 years) in immigration detention facilities and alternative places of detention. No children are detained in an immigration detention centre.

The number of children living in the community under a residence determination has increased significantly since the Government's announcement on 18 October 2010 that it would move the majority of children and a significant number of vulnerable families into community based arrangements by 30 June 2011.

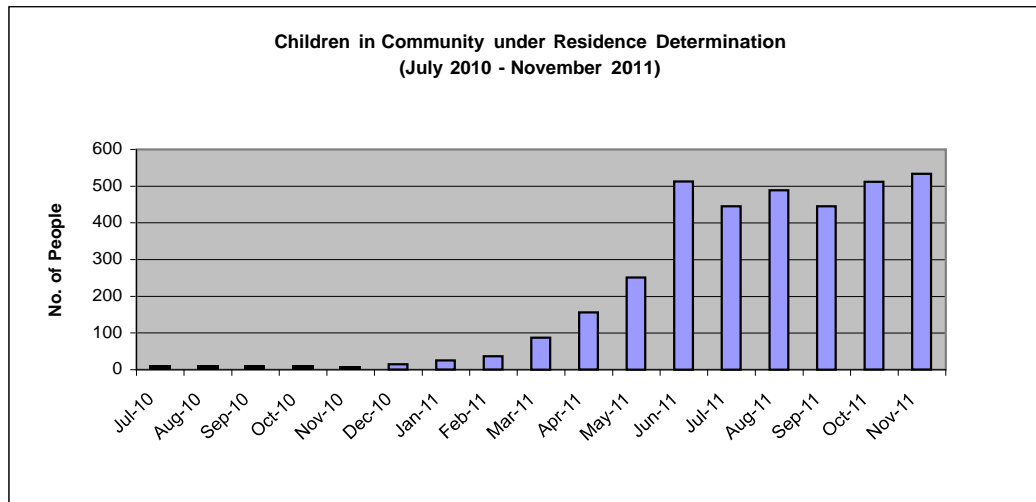
