

**APPENDIX G: STOCK ESTIMATES**

Stock data shows the number of visa holders of a specified type estimated to be in Australia at a given date. It does not refer to the number of visas granted in a given year (see Appendix F for grants data). A comparison between the stock figure and the visa grant figure shows how the period of stay of visa holders influences the stock, for example, the large number of 456 Business (Short Stay) visas granted is not reflected in stock data at any point in time because the period of stay for most visa holders is very brief.

- \* Your health may be of "special significance" and you may be required to undergo a chest x-ray and/or medical examination if:
- you are likely to enter a pharmaceutical laboratory, hospital or health care area (including nursing homes) for any reason. In this case an x-ray is minimum requirement regardless of length of stay. Low and medium risk country inhabitants may make short visits to patients in Australia without x-ray screening;
  - you are likely to be engaged or enrolled in Australian childcare centre (including preschools or creches) either as an employee or trainee. In this case an x-ray is minimum requirement regardless of length of stay;
  - you are 70 years or older. A medical pro-forma (available from the Australian visa office) to be completed by your doctor for stay of up to the periods listed above;
  - you are a parent with a "queued" migration application. A medical and x-ray is required for stay greater than 6 months; or
  - there are any indications that you might not meet the health requirement regardless of length of stay.

For student visas - principal and secondary applicants are to undergo the same medical assessment unless special significance applies.

**APPENDIX I: VISA CONDITIONS FOR TEMPORARY RESIDENTS**

There is a standard set of conditions that apply to almost all Temporary Residence visas. The standard conditions may vary between the ‘main’ applicant and their family members. The standard conditions for ‘main applicants’ are the following:

Mandatory 8107 (for the ‘main’ applicant)  
 Discretionary 8106, 8301, 8303, 8501, 8502, 8503, 8516, 8522, 8525, 8526

The table on the next page indicates where this standard set of conditions apply and where there are either additional conditions or some of the conditions do not apply.

| 8516                      | Must continue to satisfy the criteria for the grant of the visa   |
| 8522                      | Must leave Australia no later than the departure of the ‘main’ applicant. This condition can be used where a family member is accompanying someone who is coming to Australia as a temporary resident (the ‘main’ applicant) – this condition means that the person must not remain in Australia after the ‘main’ applicant leaves Australia. |
| 8525                      | Must leave Australia by a specified means of transport on a specified day or within a specified period  |
| 8526                      | Must notify DIMIA in writing, on or up to 7 days before the day the visa ceases to be in effect, of his or her place of residence in Australia  |
