



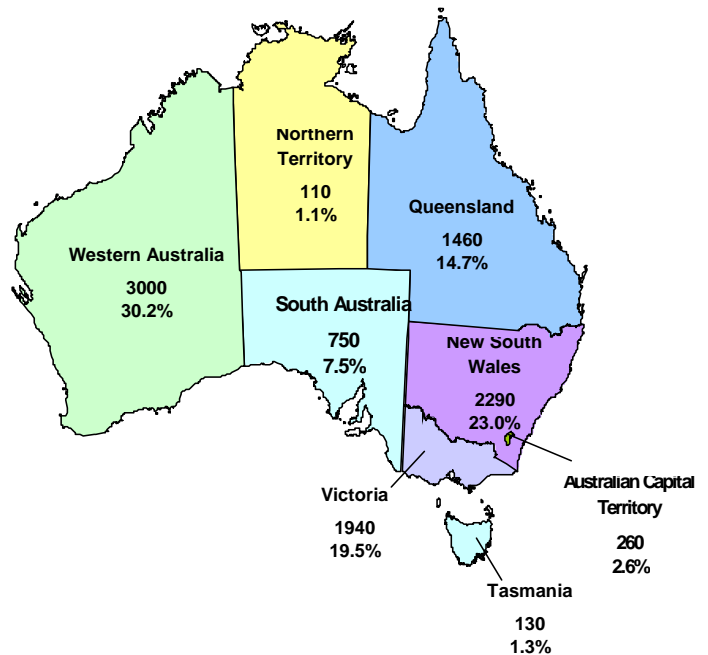
# Community Information Summary

## Kenya-born

### Today

#### Geographic Distribution

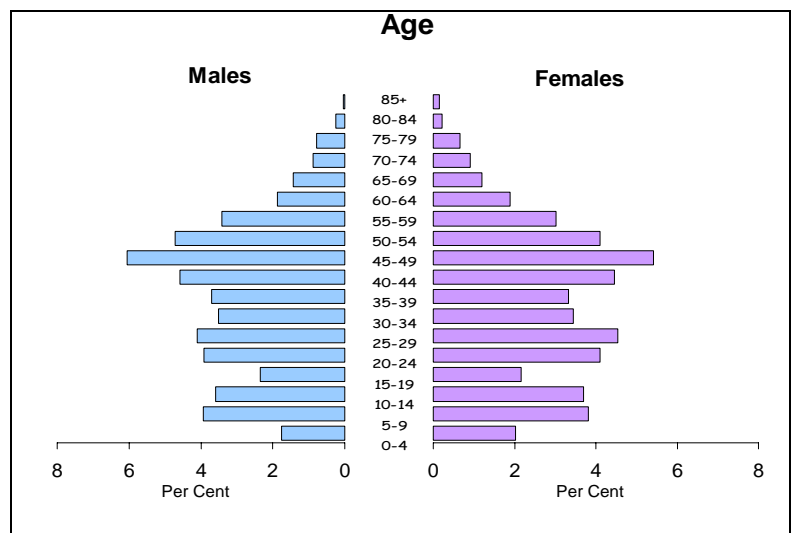
The latest Census in 2006 recorded 9930 Kenya-born people in Australia, an increase of 43.5 per cent from the 2001 Census. The 2006 distribution by state and territory showed Western Australia had the largest number with 3000 followed by New South Wales (2290), Victoria (1940) and Queensland (1460).



#### Age and Sex

The median age of the Kenya-born in 2006 was 37.2 years compared with 46.8 years for all overseas-born and 37.1 years for the total Australian population. The age distribution showed 18.8 per cent were aged 0-14 years, 12.5 per cent were 15-24 years, 31.7 per cent were 25-44 years, 30.5 per cent were 45-64 years and 6.5 per cent were 65 and over.

Of the Kenya-born in Australia, there were 5060 males (50.9 per cent) and 4880 females (49.1 per cent). The sex ratio was 103.6 males per 100 females.

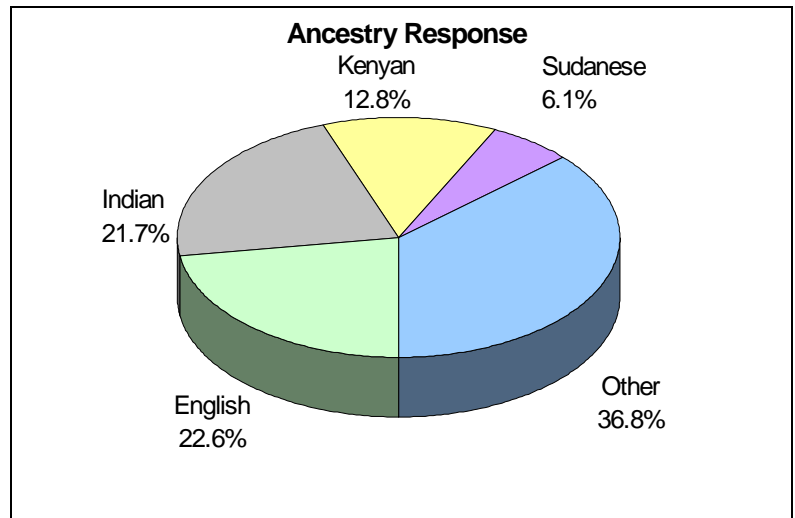


## Ancestry

In the 2006 Census, the top three ancestry responses\* that Kenya-born people reported were, English (2660), Indian (2560) and Kenyan (1500).

In the 2006 Census, Australians reported more than 250 different Ancestries. Of the total ancestry responses\*, 2160 responses were towards a Kenyan ancestry.

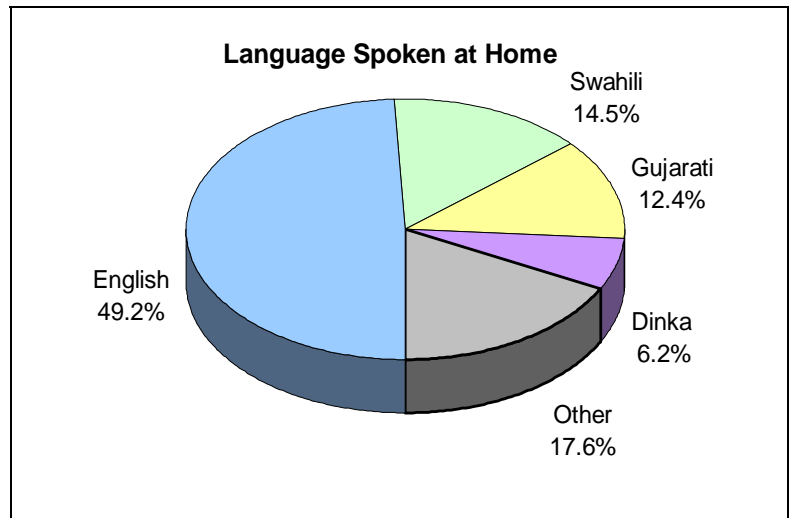
\*At the 2006 Census up to two responses per person were allowed for the Ancestry question; therefore providing the total responses and not persons count. The total ancestry responses were 25.5 million.



## Language

The main languages spoken at home by Kenya-born people in Australia were English (49.2 per cent), Swahili (14.5 per cent) and Gujarati (12.4 per cent).

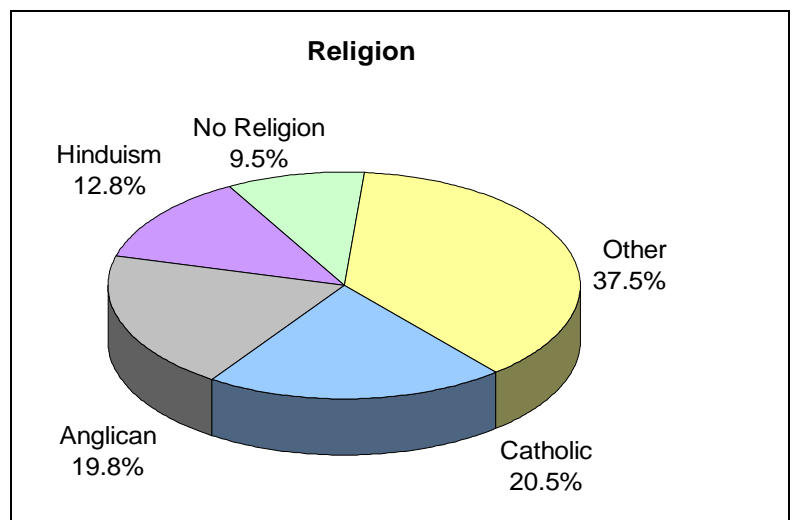
Of the 5000 Kenya-born who spoke a language other than English at home, 88.4 per cent spoke English very well or well and 9.9 per cent spoke English not well or not at all.



## Religion

At the 2006 Census the major religious affiliations amongst Kenya-born were Catholic (2040 persons), Anglican (1960 persons) and Hinduism (1270 persons).

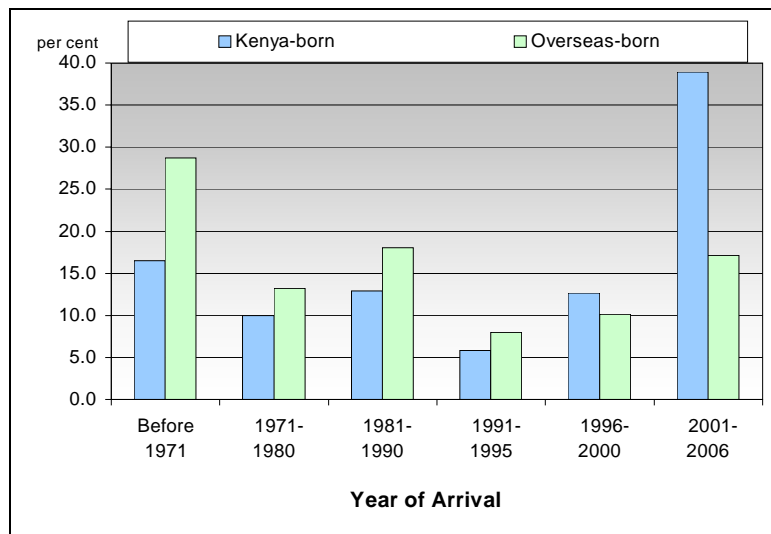
Of the Kenya-born, 9.5 per cent stated 'No Religion', this was lower than that of the total Australian population (18.7 per cent). 4.7 per cent of the Kenya-born did not state a religion.



## Arrival

Compared to 67.9 per cent of the total overseas-born population, 45.3 per cent of the Kenya-born people in Australia arrived in Australia prior to 1996.

Among the total Kenya-born in Australia at the 2006 Census, 12.6 per cent arrived between 1996 and 2000 and 38.9 per cent arrived during 2001 and 2006.



## Citizenship

At the 2006 Census, the estimated rate of Australian Citizenship for the Kenya-born in Australia was 76.7 per cent. The estimated rate for all overseas-born was 75.6 per cent. This rate includes adjustments for people not meeting the residential requirement for citizenship, temporary entrants to Australia and underenumeration at the Census.

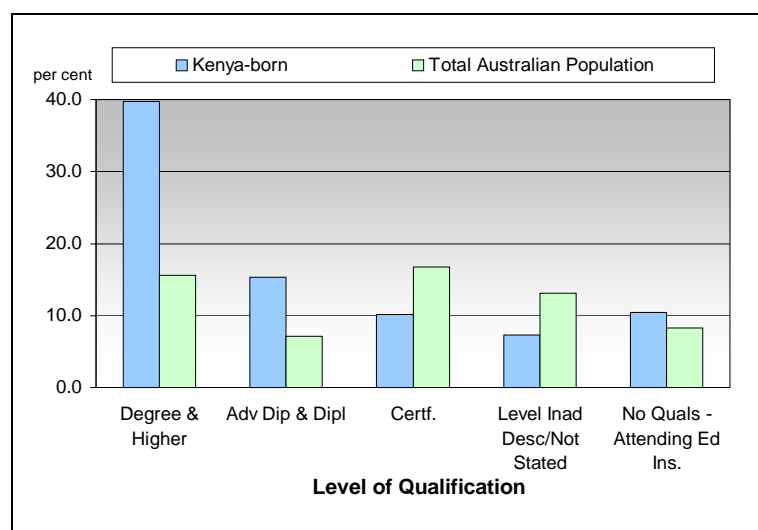
## Median Income

At the time of the 2006 Census, the median individual weekly income for the Kenya-born in Australia aged 15 years and over was \$631, compared with \$431 for all overseas-born and \$488 for all Australia-born. The total Australian population had a median individual weekly income of \$466.

## Qualifications

At the 2006 Census, 72.6 per cent of the Kenya-born aged 15 years and over had some form of higher non school qualifications compared to 52.5 per cent of the Australian population. Among the Kenya-born, 55.1 per cent had Diploma level or higher\* qualifications and 10.2 per cent had Certificate level qualifications. From the Kenya-born, 2170 had no higher non school qualification, of which 38.7 per cent were still attending an educational institution.

\* Diploma level or higher qualification includes Degree level or higher, Advanced Diploma and Diploma level.



## Employment

Among Kenya-born people aged 15 years and over, the participation rate in the labour force was 76.3 per cent and the unemployment rate was 5.7 per cent. The corresponding rates in the total Australian population were 64.6 and 5.2 per cent respectively.

Of the 5760 Kenya-born who were employed, 44.8 per cent were employed in a Skill Level 1 occupation, 11.2 per cent in Skill Level 2 and 7.5 per cent in Skill Level 3. The corresponding rates in the total Australian population were 28.7, 10.7 and 15.1 per cent respectively.
